FIRST YEAR			
First Semester	Course Name	Units	Course Description
ED 200A	Foundations of Criminology	3.0	A comprehensive study of Criminology as a science. It covers the contribution of Criminology to different disciplines like law, jurisprudence, anthropology, sociology, history, medicine, and other allied disciplines from classical times to present.
MCJ 204	Transnational Crimes and Ter	3.0	This subject focuses on the nature and concepts of Transnational Crimes and Terrorism in the Global and National perspective. Familiarize the different responses to these crimes from international bodies and individual countries.
MCJ 205	Economic Crimes	3.0	It covers the study of crimes related to economy and economic activities such as tax evasion, smuggling, money laundering and other similar crimes engaged in by individuals or group of individuals. It centers on historical and contemporary problems faced by criminal justice professionals in combating these unique criminal activities.
MCJ 209	Modern Penology	3.0	This course covers the study of the five main aspects of punishment like its definition, philosophical justification which includes utilitarianism, social defense, deterrence, recidivism, social and psychological research on punishment in society such as its relationship to authority, obedience and subordination. Analysis of various sentence structures for both misdemeanor and felony offenders is also included
Second Semester			
ED 203	Methods of Research	3.0	This course is designed to hone the knowledge, attitudes, and skills of the students in doing research. This will expose them to any of the three research paradigms and their corresponding methods as they write their research proposals and prepare their survey questionnaires for quantitative study or Interview guide for qualitative study.
MCJ 206	Crisis Intervention Managemen	3.0	It covers the strategies and techniques in managing intervention during crisis such as hostage taking, kidnapping negotiations, rules of engagement, mass demonstrations, crowd dispersal management, lock outs during labor strikes, demolitions, etc.,. It includes analysis of the methods
MCJ 208	Victimology	3.0	This course provides a comparative overview of the study of victims of crime. This includes research on the process, etiology and consequences of criminal victimization. The criminal justice's response to crime victims, both historically and more recently, will be discussed in terms of the changing role of victims in the criminal equation. Topics covered may include restorative justice, restitution, and mediation programs now offered through the criminal justice system.
MCJ 210	Science of Criminalistics	3.0	This course covers the study of the application of science and technology, its instruments and equipment used in crime detection and crime solution

ED 201	Basic Inferential Statistics	3.0	This course focuses on statistical principles in order for you to be a good user of statistical analysis. We will learn how to describe data effectively, how to run a simple regression, and how to interpret the results. The second purpose of this course is to provide you with the basic knowledge in probability theories, such as expected values or probability distributions, which are necessary in understanding criminological data
MCJ 207	Juvenile Justice and Delinquer	3.0	This course covers the study and analysis of the theory of juvenile delinquency and rule breaking. It considers the relationships between social attitudes and definition of youthful law violations. It includes a study of the Juvenile Justice system past and present

GS 100	Academic Writing	3.0	This course unfolds elemental knowledge on academic writing environments. The focus of the study will revolve around in-depth discussions on the paragraph development, thesis statement, plagiarisms, paraphrasing and referencing
GS 200	Thesis Proposal	3.0	The output of this course is to write an approved proposal in the standard format containing the specifications required for master's research. The research proposal shall contain all the elements of Chapter 1 and 2 as stipulated in the Adviser's Review Guide updated July 2018. It must include the preliminary pages and the appropriate appendices for a proposal as reflected in the same guide
MCJ 216	Domestic Violence	3.0	This subject focuses on the critical study of violence in the home perpetrated by family members, its nature, magnitude, causes, including police and public response to such violence. It includes the development and integration of holistic approaches to the protection and rehabilitation of victims

GS 300	Thesis Writing	6.0	The thesis writing shall contain all the elements of IMRAD as stipulated in the updated Adviser's Review Guide
